EPISODE OVERVIEW

Produced by the BBC World Service, *My World* is a program for tweens and teens who want to know more about the key stories and issues shaping our world. Episode Six showcases a variety of thought-provoking topics, including:

- Whether exams are the best way to test students.
- The large-scale detention of **Uighur Muslims** by the Chinese government.
- In the face of denial by Chinese authorities, how journalists uncovered the truth behind the arrest and detainment of one million Uighurs in Xinjiang, China.
- The global influence of Kobe Bryant and the impact that his death had on our youth.

NOTE: This episode covers multiple topics. If you want to take a deeper dive into a particular topic from this episode, head over to our chaptered segments. Each segment is 3-5 minutes and includes a list of prompts to engage your students in the topic covered in that segment.

PREVIEWING DISCUSSION

Suggested prompts include:

- Why do you think many education institutions rely on exams to measure learning outcomes?
- How can journalists uncover the truth when governments do not cooperate in providing accurate facts and access?
- What do you know about Uighur Muslims?
- What were Kobe Bryant's contributions to basketball and to society?

POST VIEWING DISCUSSION

Suggested prompts include:

- In what professions might it be appropriate to have traditional exams and assessments? In what professions might it be inappropriate?
- What do you think accounts for the academic success of students in Finland and Singapore, considering their limited, or lack of, testing?
- How did BBC journalists piece together the existence of prisons or concentration camps in Xinjiang province in China?
- Why do you think some of the sources interviewed by BBC journalist John Sudworth maintained their anonymity even though they were living outside of China?

EXTEND AND CONNECT

- 1. When did standardized testing become standard practice in education? Students can research how the SATs evolved from military use of IQ levels in the early 20th century. Additionally, students can understand when and how the federal government required mandatory testing in all states. Finally, students can analyze how the Coronavirus pandemic impacted annual testing in the United States or in their region.
- 2. In 2018, BBC Newsnight reported that Xinjiang province is "the most heavily monitored place on earth." Lead students to research how technology has been used to create a surveillance state in Xinjiang. Additionally, students can gain broader context for the crackdown on Uighurs by researching the geographical setting of Xinjiang, and China's ambitions to build the "One Belt, One Road" infrastructure.
